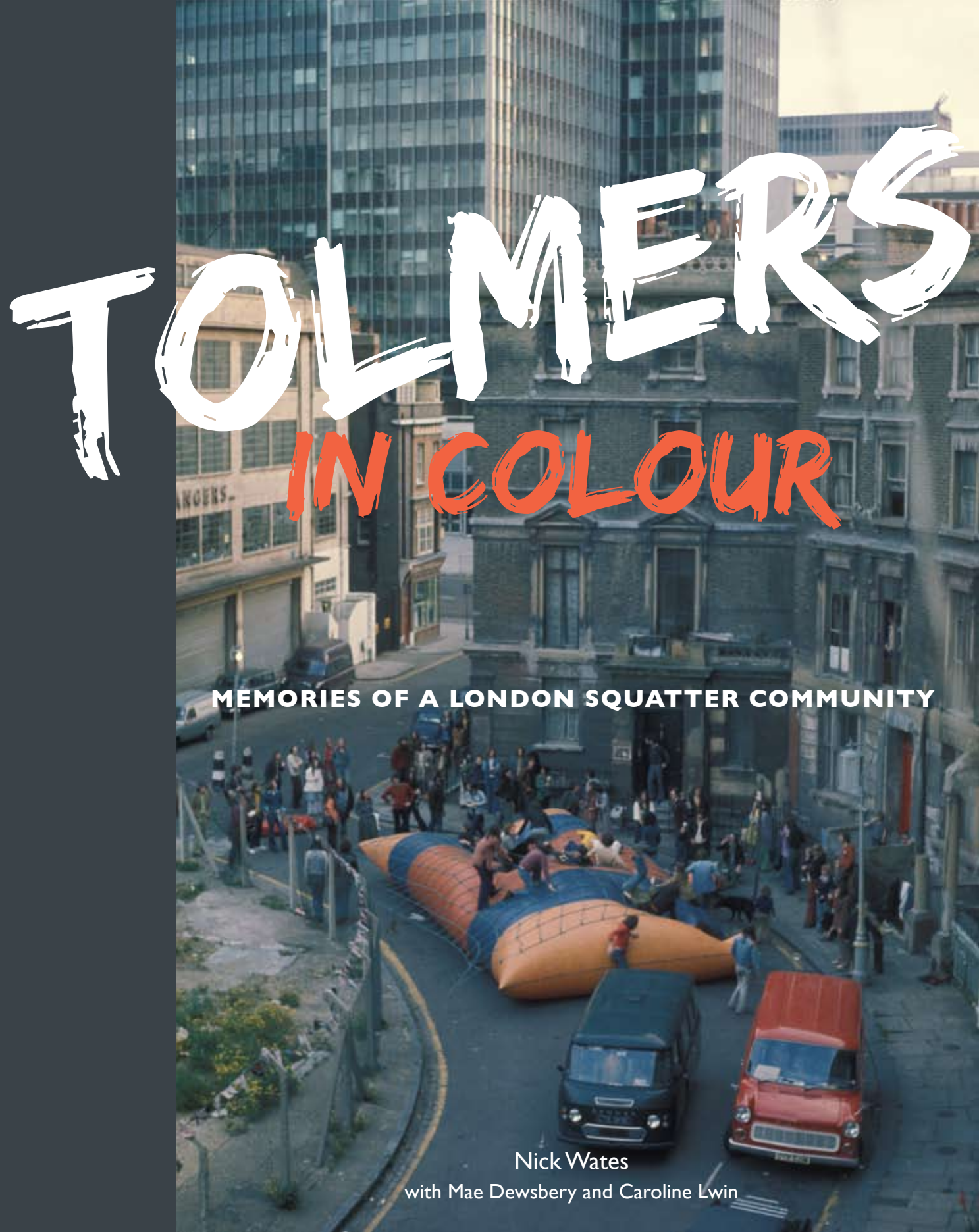

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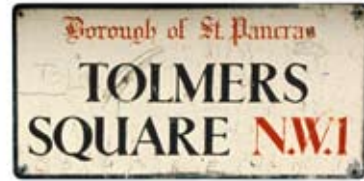

INTRODUCTION



This book is a memory of Tolmers Square in central London where a group of squatters carried out a novel experiment in community living and resisted, for six years, the destruction of a once-charming London square.

In the early 1970s, London was still feeling the effects of the Blitz with large areas still unreconstructed. As property was relatively cheap, frantic redevelopment was taking place across the capital by keen developers aware of potential huge returns.

Local planning and architecture students were aware of the growing public criticism of 1960s comprehensive redevelopment whereby vast areas of Victorian shops and housing were replaced with soulless estates. They became the first squatters in Tolmers Square – determined to fight the developers and prevent them buying empty and derelict homes in the Square in order to build speculative offices.

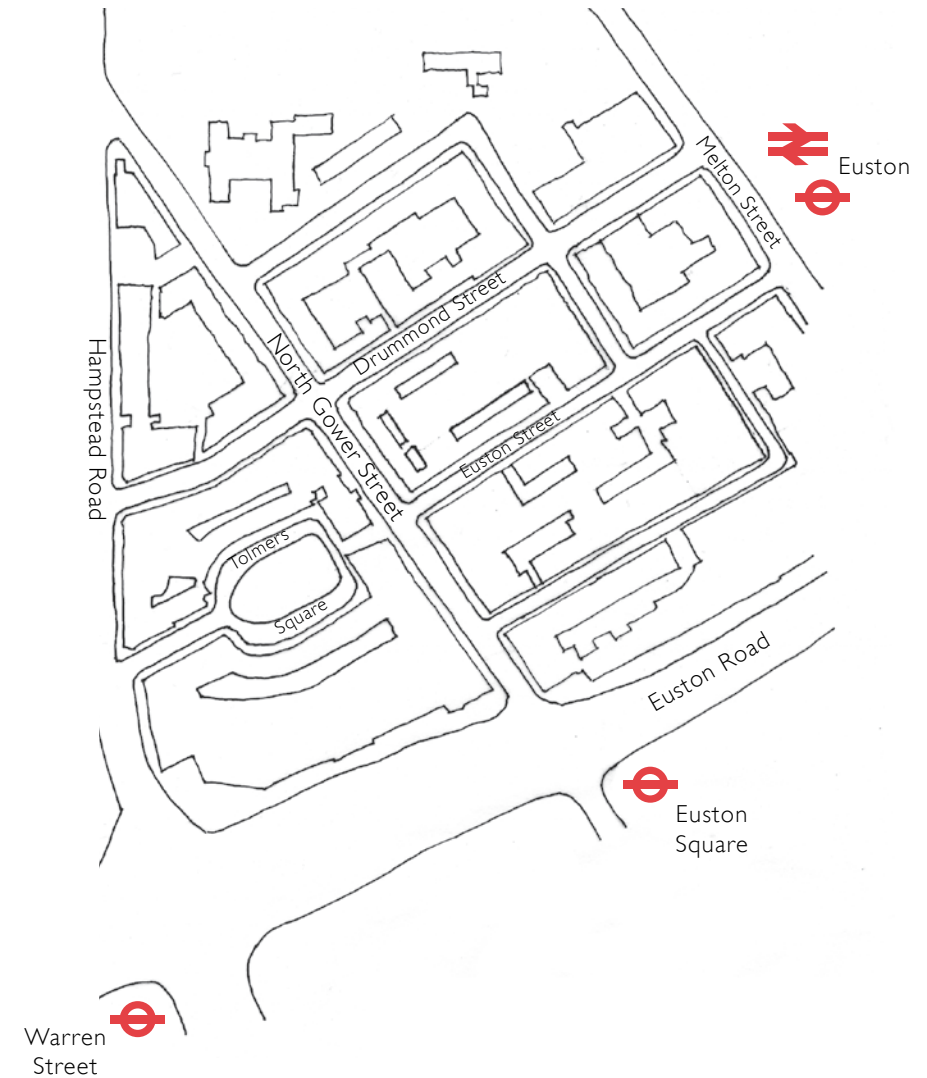
The full story of this development saga can be found in my book, *The Battle for Tolmers Square* (RKP 1976), which I wrote at the time I was squatting in Tolmers Square. *Tolmers in Colour* contains a selection of my archive photos and is published to coincide with an exhibition in Berlin and Dresden called *Goodbye London: Radical Art & Politics in the 1970s* – which also includes images of the Tolmers squatting community.

Most of the photos were taken by me but some were taken by my then partner, Caroline Lwin. Our daughter Mae Dewsbery designed the book and selected the photos from an archive of more than 1,500 35mm slides, catalogued by our son Max Wates. Neither were born at the time but have found the experience a fascinating insight into 1970s radical politics: both the early lives of their parents and a generation of radical Londoners.

- 1972 Tolmers Square becomes prominent in the press as a property development hotspot
- 1973 Squatters start moving into empty houses
Tolmers Village Association formed
- 1974 First Tolmers carnival
Derelict land in Drummond Street occupied
- 1975 Anti eviction campaign by squatters. High Court action by developer to evict squatters fails
- 1976 Camden Council buys land from developer
- 1977 Temporary landscaping of the centre of Tolmers Square
- 1978 Last Tolmers carnival
- 1979 Eviction of south side of Tolmers Square and all other squats in the area
Eviction of north side of Tolmers Square
- 1982 New Tolmers Square housing scheme formally opened

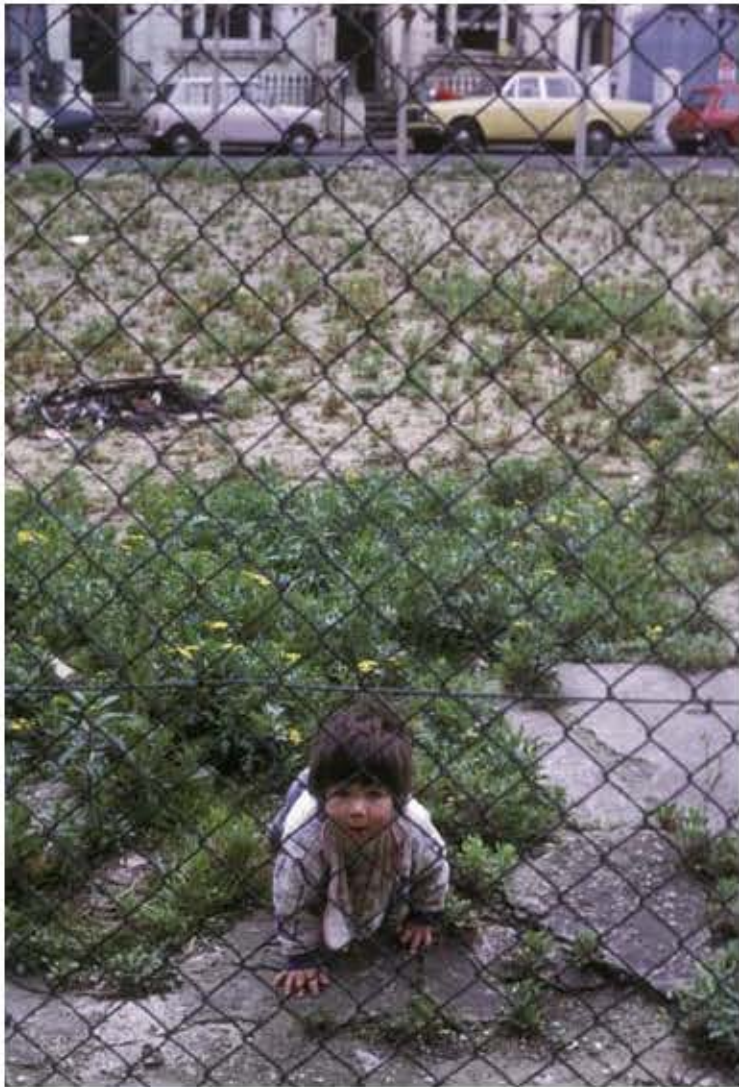

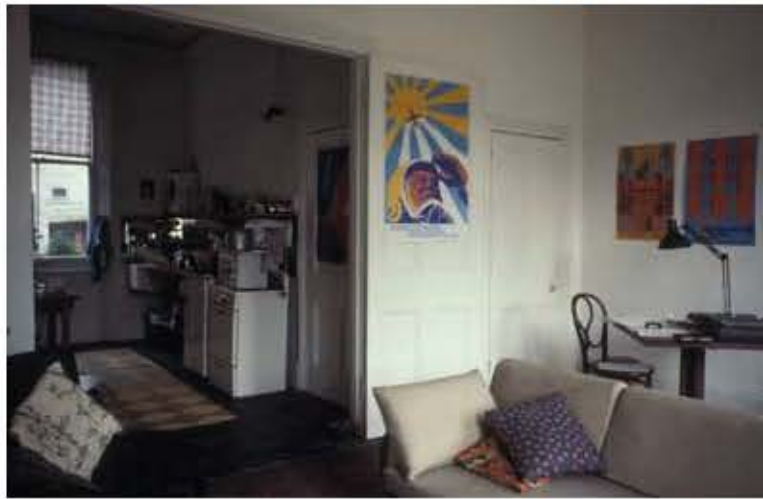

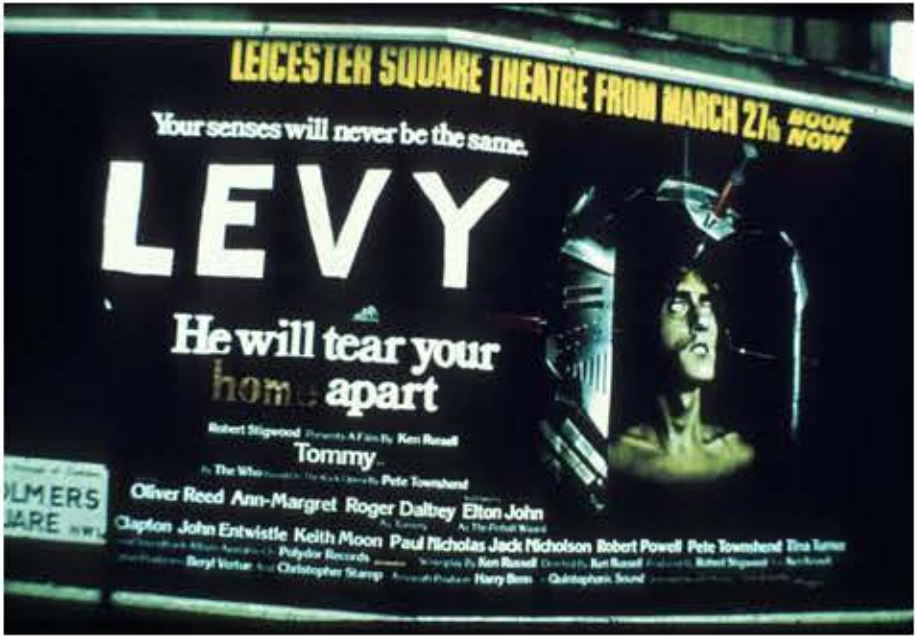
